A variety of ways for you to participate

Shemiko at St. Francis Xavier in Peel Region shares, "Pandemic restrictions and protocols have limited our connections with families, so we've been engaging parents in what we call Community Outreach."

"Last year, we created a Community Art show for our child care families and the community at large. Children were engaged in many different art experiences; we then displayed their work in our windows for parents and passersby to enjoy. Parents were also invited to submit art they created together with children at home. School staff and parents were then invited to a "gallery walk". It was so



exciting for the children to see people walking past the windows to view their creations!" she adds.

"This year, our Community Outreach activities have included sending home Play Doh kits, books and art supplies to create their own story books, a Fun in

the Snow poster featuring different ways families can have fun outdoors and Family Picture Collage kits (poster board and art supplies to illustrate the things they like to do together). Our Community Outreach initiative is just one example of how we

Partnerships support the well-being of children and families

At Gordon Graydon Early Learning Child Care Centre in Mississauga, Janet, a Supervisor, puts herself out in the community through volunteer work and sitting on Parent Councils:

"Parents get to know me, and I get to know them. One of the best ideas I ever had was to bring my espresso maker to work. Sometimes, just a "good morning" or "how are you?" or an invitation to grab a quick espresso with me before work can make all the difference! I want parents to know that my door is always open and I'm always here to listen; that goes a long way!" Janet says. "An honest to goodness truthful, authentic relationship is key. Keeping the lines of communication open at all times is also key–particularly if a parent is upset. After just letting them talk and actively listening, I let them know I've heard them, propose next steps, and assure them I'll follow up with them. All these things build trust. Getting parents involved with seasonal celebrations, fundraising, barbecues and parent workshops are also key– as is offering child minding so they are free to attend workshops or parent council meetings."

"Not every one of our child care

centres has access to an app called Storypark, but many do. Staff use it to take photos of the children or make short videos of their learning environments. It's a great opportunity for parents to observe their children throughout the day, to see how learning happens. And the great thing is, they can share this app with loved ones—across the street or across the ocean."

Working to earn and maintain a family's trust over time is one of Family Day's 8 Key Principles of Child Care.

Building your trust and confidence are key

Ashley, a Centre Supervisor at St. Sylvester Child Care Centre Silver Springs Extended Day & School Age & Program shares how she builds trust and confidence with parents.

"I make the effort to learn how each parent prefers to be addressed whether it's 'Mrs. Khan' or their first name. Asking for their preference—and remembering to use it—communicates respect and creates an instant bond." "Every parent is unique; there are different parenting styles and family roles. I strive to learn and understand their specific needs and concerns. Understandably, new or first-time parents can be a little more apprehensive, anxious or nervous on their first visit, or on their child's first day; I do whatever I can to reassure them and put them at ease. Since COVID, parents have not been able to enter our facility, so we created a video of the classroom to give them an idea of what to expect; it was very well received."

Shemiko, Janet, and Ashley are just three great examples of our Family Day principles in practice. As they've demonstrated, there are many ways for parents to partner with us. And we're committed to finding the ways that work best for YOU.

Ingredients (Serves 3) 1 tbsp olive oil 1 medium potato, cut into cubes 1 spring/green onion, finely sliced Handful baby spinach leaves 4 eggs 9 small cherry tomatoes, halved

Handful crumbled feta

(or grated cheddar if **you** prefer) 3 dinner rolls

Omelette in a Bun

This tasty vegetarian omelette roll is great when **you** are short on time

Directions

STEP 1 Heat the oil in a small nonstick frying pan and fry the potato over a low heat until it is browned and tender. This will probably take about 10 mins. Add the spring onion and fry for a minute then stir in the spinach.

STEP 2 Whisk the eggs lightly with a little seasoning and then pour them into the pan and cook until set on the base. Dot on the tomatoes, sprinkle on the cheese and grill until the top browns. Cool a little then slide out of the pan and cut into thirds. **STEP 3** Split the rolls and stuff them with a piece of omelette, sandwich together and halve.
